

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AT OUGHTIBRIDGE PRIMARY SCHOOL

2025/26 SPORTS PREMIUM REPORT



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What is Sports Premium?

Nationally, the Government provides funding each year to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see the money going directly to headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

How much funding will our school receive?

At Oughtibridge Primary School, we received £19530 in the academic year 2025-26 to improve the quality of Physical Education, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) for all of the children at our school.

The purpose of the funding

Any use of the PE and sport premium must be in accordance with the terms outlined in this document. This means schools must use the PE and sport premium to:

- build capacity and capability within the school and ensure that improvements to the quality of PE, sport and physical activity provision made now are sustainable and will benefit pupils joining the school in future years; and
- develop or add to the PE, sport and physical activity that the school provides

The purpose of this document

Schools are required to publish details of the way in which they spent their funding over the previous year. At Oughtibridge Primary School, we have looked at a number of ways of presenting this information and have decided upon the following.

The Department for Education (DfE) have listed 5 Key Indicators that the effectiveness of funding can be measured against. For each Key Indicator, this document will break down the steps that we have taken to try and meet the expectations. The current Key Indicators are:

1. increasing all staff's confidence, knowledge and skills in teaching PE and sport
2. increasing engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity and sporting activities
3. raising the profile of PE and sport across the school, to support whole school improvement
4. offer a broader and more equal experience of a range of sports and physical activities to all pupils
5. increase participation in competitive sport

Rationale

The tables below give details as to how our Sports Premium funding has being spent in order to improve PE outcomes for the whole school over recent years.

It has been lovely to celebrate these achievements at the whole school level	Successes include: - 2x top 10 individual finishes in KS2 Cross Country - 1x top 3 relay finishes in KS2 Cross Country - Yorkshire champions in Y4 cricket - Sheffield champions in Y5 basketball - City champions, and bronze medallists at South Yorkshire level, in Y5 swimming - 1st and 3rd place finishes in Y5 Cycle Speedway
Awarded Gold in School Games Award for the fourth consecutive year	A continued emphasis and high-profile of PESSPA at Oughtibridge has been recognised with the award of a 'gold' standard for School Games. We are now eligible to apply for the platinum award in 2025/26	- In order to meet this award, the school has to evidence progress towards 'active minutes' in the school day, equality of offer in a sporting context, opportunities for sporting positive experiences, a positive sporting culture, youth engagement, diversity of sports offered and a broad and balanced curriculum.

How much has your school spent on CPD for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£1,926.00	The school has invested in targeted CPD for key members of staff this academic year in order to improve both the coordination and delivery of PE at Oughtibridge. Staff members across Key Stage 2 engaged in gymnastics CPD in order to improve the quality of teaching of the PE curriculum. This was offered following prior staff voice that highlighted gymnastics as an area of the curriculum where staff were lower in confidence. Subject coordinators continue to engage with the annual PESSPA Conference at Hillsborough Stadium, sharing best practise amongst PE coordinators across the city, and receiving key updates ahead of the academic year.
How much has your school spent on CPD upskilling staff to deliver swimming lessons for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£0.00	N/A
How much has your school spent on extra-curricular opportunities for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£2,522.03	As always, the school has worked diligently to ensure that financial circumstances are not a barrier to accessing PESSPA for children at Oughtibridge. The school has committed a significant portion of our funding this year to part-funding places at extra-curricular clubs for children who appear on our disadvantaged registers. School staff target these children in

		advance of clubs going 'live' to secure places in circumstances where families are interested. The school has also worked closely with a local company to enhance our 'Dance' curriculum offer, and are hoping to use this opportunity to grow interest and broaden our extra-curricular offer in the future.
How much has your school spent on equipment and resources for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£9,504.49	Over the course of the 25/26 academic year, the school has worked hard to source appropriate resources in order to enhance our PESSPA offer to all children. In addition to regular spending to replenish equipment levels, the school has looked at how we can improve provision for a range of learners. A new outdoor provision area has been constructed that enables pupils to be creative in an outdoor setting. This equipment will all remain in situ going forwards, which will hopefully improve learning conditions for a range of pupils.
How much has your school spent on membership and subscription fees for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£1,677.48	The school renewed our subscription to Get Set 4 PE this year on a 3-year contract. This subscription will allow us to provide high-quality PE lessons to all classes for the next three years. After implementing this scheme of learning, staff were surveyed to ask their opinion and it was highlighted that this scheme of learning is far preferred to our previous subscription. The scheme also supports staff in scaffolding or challenging pupils to ensure that all children can make the most progress from their individual starting points.

How much has your school spent on activities organised by the SGO network for the academic year 2025 to 2026?	£1,540.00	Oughtibridge Primary School continued to foster strong relationships with our School Games Orangeriser and School Sports Partnership – LINKS – in 25/26 and attended many events that were facilitated by this team.
